MHS Testing Website - Take advantage of the [Marcus testing website](#), which provides information on tests you may need to take while in high school.

SAT/ACT – If you are planning to attend a four-year university after graduating high school, you will need to take the SAT or ACT. You should plan to take the test sometime junior year after having Algebra 2. If your score is not as high as you want, you may choose to take the test again so you are submitting your best scores to colleges. Marcus offers one free ACT or SAT test to juniors and seniors during the school day. Otherwise, students can register for these tests on their individual websites where you will select a testing date, location, and pay for the test. **SAT:** www.collegeboard.org **ACT:** my.act.org. **Marcus School Code 444-132**

PSAT - The Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) measures what you're learning in school, determines if you're on track, and opens doors for opportunities to prepare and pay for college. All sophomores take the test nationwide in the month of October. Junior year, students have the opportunity to register and pay to take the test again in effort to qualify for national scholarships. Four-Year Plan – It is important to keep your 4-year plan updated. Make sure you are taking the required courses for your graduation plan. Here is an [example](#) of a 4-year plan.

GPA / Rank - GPA and corresponding rank are determined by grades earned in all courses counting towards your GPA. GPA is cumulative and begins your 9th-grade year. Your class rank becomes available after the fall semester of sophomore year. [GPA](#) and [Rank](#) are calculated at the end of each nine week term.

VLA – The Virtual Learning Academy, through LISD, provides online classes, including core classes and electives. Students are able to take 1-3 VLA courses during the school year and/or in summer. Select courses taken during the school day are at no cost. Courses taken outside the school day or in the summer cost \$250 per 0.5 credit (*discount for students on free & reduced lunch*). Dual Credit - A dual credit class is where you earn both high school and college credit for the course. Students can take dual credit courses through NCTC or we offer select courses on our campus. College, Career, Military Readiness (CCMR) - Preparing students for life after graduation and is integrated into everyday culture. LISD strives for each student to meet at least one of the CCMR indicators below through high school programming.

- Score 3 on any AP exam in grades 9-12
- Dual Course Credit
 - 3 hours of dual course credit in ELA or Math - OR
 - 9 hours of dual course credits accumulated across subjects
- Earn an Associate's Degree prior to graduation
- Complete aligned sequence of CTE coursework in Program of Study & earn Industry-Based Certification (IBC)
- Meet specific criteria on assessments of college readiness - SAT, ACT, or TSIA2
